Methodology and Topline

The survey results below appear in the Public Agenda report "America's Hidden Common Ground on Strengthening Democracy" which summarizes findings from a national survey of 1,260 adult Americans ages 18 and older from the continental U.S., Alaska, and Hawaii. The survey was fielded online May 24 to 27, 2021 by Ipsos in English. The Kettering Foundation served as a collaborator in this research. This research is supported in part by the Charles Koch Institute and Civic Health Project. When referencing this report, please cite Public Agenda.

The sample for this study was randomly drawn from Ipsos' online panel (see link for more info on "Access Panels and Recruitment"), partner online panel sources, and "river" sampling (see link for more info on the Ipsos "Ampario Overview" sample method) and does not rely on a population frame in the traditional sense. Ipsos uses fixed sample targets, unique to each study, in drawing a sample. After a sample has been obtained from the Ipsos panel, Ipsos calibrates respondent characteristics to be representative of the U.S. Population using standard procedures such as raking-ratio adjustments. The source of these population targets is U.S. Census 2018 American Community Survey data. The sample drawn for this study reflects fixed sample targets on demographics. Posthoc weights were made to the population characteristics on gender, age, race/ethnicity, region, and education.

Statistical margins of error are not applicable to online non-probability surveys. All sample surveys and surveys may be subject to other sources of error, including, but not limited to coverage error and measurement error. Where figures do not sum to 100, this is due to the effects of rounding. The precision of Ipsos online surveys is measured using a credibility interval. In this case, the survey has a credibility interval of plus or minus 3.1 percentage points for all respondents. Ipsos calculates a design effect (DEFF) for each study based on the variation of the weights, following the formula of Kish (1965). This study had a credibility interval adjusted for design effect of the following (n=1,260, DEFF=1.5, adjusted Confidence Interval=+/-4.6 percentage points). The survey has a credibility interval of plus or minus 5.6 percentage points for Democrats, plus or minus 6.4 percentage points for Republicans, plus or minus 6.4 percentage points for Independents, and plus or minus 7.2 percentage points for politically unaffiliated individuals.

Some questions in this survey are trended with a survey conducted September 14 to October 15, 2018, for Public Agenda by Wiese Research Associates, Inc. and released August 2019. That survey was based on a nationally-representative probability sample of adults aged 18 or older (n=1,000) and conducted over the phone and online. Some questions in this survey are trended with a survey conducted November 6 to December 28, 2019, for Public Agenda by Wiese Research Associates, Inc. and released July 2020. That survey was based on a nationally-representative probability sample of adults aged 18 or older (n=1,000) and conducted over the phone and online. The 2018 and 2019 surveys were fielded via telephone interviews. In 2021, the survey was fielded online. While significant changes in data points from the telephone surveys to the online survey can largely be attributed to the changing environment, switching from a phone to online approach may have also generated a mode effect. Questions that allowed telephone respondents to volunteer "Don't know" as a response in the telephone surveys also included "Don't know" as an explicit response category in the online survey. The topline includes this "Don't know" option for all questions that included it as an explicit response category in the online survey. The topline denotes questions that included "Don't know" as an explicit response category in the telephone surveys but did not include "Don't know" in the online survey with a dash (-), indicating null or missing values. Insignificant values of less than 0.5% are indicated with an asterisk (*).
